Examples of the Difference We Make

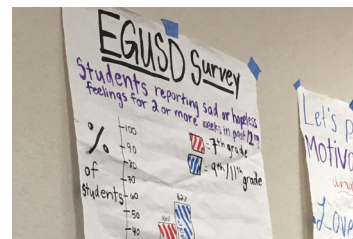
Expanded Interim Care Program (ICP)



This innovative program provides lay-in respite care shelter for post-hospitalization patients who are homeless. ICP provides shelter, food, restorative rest, health care coordination and

case management services, in a unique partnership between the health systems, government entities and FQHC partners. In 2018 KP NCAL co-funded an expansion of the ICP with the other three health systems to grow the program to 75 recuperative beds; an investment of \$3.3 million over three years.

Student Mental Health & Trauma-Informed Staff Training



Through a combination of local and regional community benefit grants, Sacramento City USD and Elk Grove USD launched several new mental health awareness programs focused on

LGBTQ students and students with a history of trauma. Elk Grove USD established new Gay-Straight Alliance clubs and provided awareness training for staff and students.
